Napier Sues Ghost For \$75,000.00

Southeastern Is Not The Third Leg

Hi Folks:

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In the last issue of the Ghost the banner line said "NEW EXAMINING SCHOOL OPENS IN FLORIDA". To those who have read this, we wish to inform you that it was a very serious mistake. Southeastern Center of Scientology will NOT be the third leg of the HASI in this locality and from what we can make out of the communications from Phoenix, THERE WILL BE NO EXAMINING SCHOOLS FOR B. SCN. EXCEPT IN PHOENIX.

All the misunderstanding arose from the poor communication of the editor of the Ghost in misunderstanding Ron just before leaving Phoenix. We brought back from Phoenix the twisted idea that Ron had told us personally that we would have an examining school to the degree of B. Scn. In fact, it was such a strong impression that it was understood (twisted by us, of course) that we would have the HCA examining school at once, and that by the time we had students ready, (three months from July 1st, on October 1st) the arrangements would be worked out for the examining of B. Scns. This was the basis of the story.

Immediately after the story was published, a letter from John W. Galusha,

On or about September 20th this year, P. D. Napier, of Orlando, filed a suit against the editor and publisher of the Ghost of Scientology for \$75,000.00 damage that he claimed was caused to his reputation as a Scientologist and chiropractor issuing from a story published in the Ghost in Phoenix under date of June 25th, 1954.

NAPIER CLAIMS THE DR. VICKS VAPOR-RUB STORY IN GHOST REFERRED TO HIM.

Under another story in the Ghost of the same date there was a story (about an unnamed doctor that was intended to warn lady preclears that they should check any auditor's reputation before subjecting themselves to processing, and especially check on the reputation of auditors who might come under this category.

Napier took offense at this story and seemed to think that it was pointed

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New Course in Training And Processing

Starts Every Other Monday

The first class in the HCA course started at Southeastern and is now nearing its fourth week. The first four weeks of this course is nothing but processing in order to bring students up to a level to be able to accept and absorb the data that is to come later. It also gets their banks straightened out so that preclears that they process will not stir them up and throw the auditor for a loop. This processing is absolutely necessary and is mandatory to taking the HCA course here.

Results have been nothing short of miraculous this first few weeks . . . For instance, one lady student who has not seen a glimmer of light for over thirty-seven years, has been getting flashes of light from time to time for the first time since she was seven years old. The curtain over her eyes which has always been black, she says is now a light brown. Others have shown even

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New Church of Scientology

On August 9th of this year a new Church of Scientology was signed into the Florida Law at Orlando, Florida.

The Church was chartered by Clem. W. Johnson, Lois Johnson, Wm. H. Bradner, Saidee Bradner, W. F. Pearson, Erma Jane Pearson and Walter Stark, all of Orlando, Florida, except the Bradners, who reside in the nearby city of Winter Park.

The Church, a non-profit organization, is authorized to train and issue certificates, to ordain ministers, to practice spiritual healing of body and mind and to collect fees and donations for services rendered.

The Church, immediately recognizing that the people in this area were far more impressed with a "science" than with a religion, called a meeting and

resolved to operate under a fictitious name (Florida law) and represent Scientology as a science until the interested people, one at a time, could be taught the difference between a "religious practice" and a "religious wisdom" or "philosophy". So they decided to call the operation Southeastern Scientology and advertised this business as being owned and operated by the Church of Scientology. The advertising had to be carried once a week for four weeks and duly recorded in the Circuit Court of Orange County. This was done and Southeastern Scientology was legally born. Clem. W. Johnson, D. Scn., D.I. was elected as Chairman of the Trustees of the Church and as Director of Southeastern Scientology Lois Johnson, B. Scn., was elected Secretary.

to get a church charter, get our furniture from South Florida, both for the house and the office, refinish all office furniture, buy some more, get out the last issue of the Ghost, get mailed 7,500 copies of The Golden Age. . . Send out about 500 personal letters, run a processing group five nights a week from August first through to present time. Take a short trip to South Florida, give intensives to about six or seven preclears to the tune of about 40 hours each, operate the office from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., process from 8 p.m. till 10 p.m. five days a week, get out advertising, have stationery printed, find all best places to buy paper and other items, have telephones installed, lights and water turned on, answer a lot of mail, (we know we didn't answer all letters, and for this we are sorry; but you see how it was.) and get day classes started and in this short time we even managed to get sued for \$75,000. So you see, we have not been completely idle.

Then on October 16th preclears from Canada and New York started coming in for classes starting Monday the 18th. These classes have really been taking up the time . . . 8:30 a.m. until 5:30 p.m. and again from 8 p.m. till 10 p.m. at night. This is the processing part of the HCA course; but there are several preclears that come only for the processing and brother they are getting it, and so are we. We gave every one of them nothing but opening procedure the first week . . . We learned that we could process two at a time in opening procedure, personally, so all hands and the cook had to turn out to give opening procedure to the class for 40 hours that week . . . It really took the starch out of the auditors too. This week hasn't been so bad, we made it a point to get every single preclear exteriorized during the first week and then threw them into group processing and started to really give them a work out. We hit the hottest stuff in the bank and really bore down on it for two full hours while the session was recorded on tape. The balance of that day the tapes were played over three times. Sometimes, or rather often, a preclear would have to be taken from the group and brought up to present time, or run a spot in space on some incident and back into the group he went. And this sort of processing for groups is really paying off. We do not know of any group processing anywhere that has gotten the results that this group has after 40 hours of personal opening procedure. There is little use, it would seem to us at this time, to try to group process on a group that has not had plenty of opening procedure. The night class that we ran for the first six weeks here did not show the results that this group is showing now, although we gave plenty of group opening procedure too. 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the HASI informed the director of Southeastern Scientology, Clem W. Johnson, that they had had a board meeting and "Resolved" — "That Clem Johnson not be allowed to train."

This information was sent to L. Ron Hubbard at his home and immediately a Western Union telegram came, Quote — "Certify to HCA level as Church of Scientology of Orlando, not as HASI. No other examination necessary than yours to HCA." Unquote.

Later on September 4th a letter came from John Galusha, President of Board of Directors of HASI informing us that they had held another meeting and agreed that they "Strike out the motion that Clem Johnson not be allowed to train." These meetings were held and controlled by a majority of three — John Galusha, Kenneth Barrett and Ralph Swanson.

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right at him so hard that he used it as the basis, or at least one, for his claim for damages.

Many of the scientologists in the field and especially in Orlando have come to the Ghost and said that they wondered vaguely just who Dr. Vicks Vapor-Rub was; but it had never entered their mind that the Ghost was talking about HIM, until they read about his claim in the papers. Some who knew him personally, were very surprised when they read it in the local daily paper and wondered WHY he would claim that he was the one referred to, when it did not appear to them that there was any connection between him and the story in the Ghost.

Many came in after reading the local paper and asked to see a copy of the Ghost in which the story appeared. After reading it, each and every one, ask WHY Napier thinks that he is the one referred to? The editor has no answer for such questions—we can't imagine why either!

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more marked improvement in their cases.

The first unit of intensive processing has been used as a test for settling on the most optimum manner in which to conduct a group intensive . . . Bugs have been worked out and the schedule was settled to a routine within the first two weeks.

Opening procedure by 8-C and duplication was given the first week of forty hours. Then exterioriation became very easy and the first two days of the second week saw every student exteriorized. From there on it was easy sailing. Some students had to be taken from the group from time to time and given personal processing for an hour or several and put back in; but fewer had to be pulled out than had been expected, and it is now known that opening procedure was responsible for that.

The schedule is now worked out and runs like clock work and taking new students every week will be an advantage instead of a disadvantage, as there are enough auditors here to give forty hours of opening procedure the first week, and then a few hours of exteriorization processing and they go right into the group for the balance of their processing. This processing is within eighty per cent as effective as personal processing and maybe more. All the intensive procedures of the Auditor's Handbook, 1954 are included in this course and the only thing left to clean up a case would be to run universes which the director has not figured out how to run in groups as yet; but they are certainly relieved to a great ex-

DIANEWS EDITOR SPEAKS

My dear Clement:

First, I want to thank you for providing us with more genuine amusement than any dianetic publication in quite a while.

Secondly, I'm going to indulge myself in the pleasure of setting you straight. I haven't bothered answering your previous remarks, because I don't waste time on personalities. This time, however, you were dealing with facts, and got way off base.

Following are corrections of your errors. (This is a condensed version of my answer in the Dianews, to save you the trouble of copying off the whole of the original for the Ghost.)

Error No. 1. That the Dianews reprint "championed" Sara Hubbard. Really, Glen, didn't you bother to read it? I suggest you look at pages 16 and 19, reprint issue. (Samples: "nothing will justify Sara's deliberate creation of a public scandal . . . spoiled woman.") I also call to your attention, on page 19: ". . . when all the facts are revealed, Hubbard will be shown to have acted in every way, justifiably and honorably."

Error No. 2. That the reprint issue was put out "for no other reason than to try to strike a nasty blow at Hubbard."

Again, please note the above-quoted statement on page 19. Since when does Hubbard regard a defense of him as a "nasty blow"? For our reason, please note issues 7, 10, and 14, of Volume I, page 1 in each, published in 1951 and 1952, in which I promised to reprint the first six issues someday for the benefit who requested them. Did I not send you a set of back issues?

Error No. 3. Your suggestion that the FBI should check us for possible Communist taint. (!!!)

Of course, we realize this choice gem of intuition merely arose from your loyalty to Hubbard and your desire to protect him. Your motives are commendable, but your methods regrettably reckless. I'm afraid you picked the wrong people this time.

As a matter of fact, George probably has the best security clearance in Dianetics or Scientology. Every job he has held since entering the Navy in 1942 has required his clearance by the FBI for handling classified matter, right up to his present research job with Lockland. And, as you may not know, such a clearance embraces the man's family and relatives and friends also.

Error No. 4. Your (?) notion that Sarah may be "behind or associated with (us) in one way or another."

As a matter of fact, we haven't bothered to keep any more track of Sara than you have in the last three years. You aroused our curiosity, however; for what we found out, see the next issue of the Dianews. It would be nice, for a change, if someone were backing or as-

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tent, and very little time should be required for them after this group intensive.

After this course of processing the student will really be in shape to receive the HCA course in another four weeks. The director at Southeastern and other auditors here believe that the students even after the first two weeks of the processing received in this unit were in better shape than most other students ever known to start off in courses elsewhere.

sociated with us, but it just ain't so.

Sara, incidentally, is probably the very last person in the world who would give us any help. Besides our Dianews remarks, I also sent her some nasty personal letters, which I now regret. If she read any of them, we have no better enemy.

It is true that we don't agree with much of Scientology; however, we're quite capable of reaching such conclusions for ourselves. We try to keep our personal feelings about it out of the Dianews as much as possible, however; but if the facts, stripped of whitewash, don't always come out favorable, we're not going to dodge them just because somebody won't like it. However, you'll find that any given issue of the Dianews has far fewer derogatory adjectives in it than a certain independent Scientological publication I could name.

Error No. 5. That Sara and various unnamed (why?) Foundation personnel are Communists.

I don't intend to have any factual data on their ideological affiliations. But I do have the following facts from the local FBI office:

(1) The FBI makes its investigations in the strictest secrecy, not even revealing that an investigation is going on, let alone who is being investigated or why.

(2) The FBI makes no announcements about the results of its investigations.

(3) The FBI will not reveal to any person save those authorized by law any information in their files.

The only conclusions to be drawn from these facts are: that since you, Clem, are not an "authorized person", you cannot have obtained any such information about Sara and the others legitimately. Either, then, you are passing on the product of someone's lively imagination; or, you got the information illegally, in which case the FBI would probably be actively interested in you and your source. How about it?

Incidentally, we're not mad at you. We realize, you see, that the things we don't admire about your behavior are not really you, they are your aberrations. Underneath all that is your basic personality, however concealed at present; and your basic personality, like everyone else's is a pretty nice person. We hope we'll have the pleasure of making its acquaintance some day.
