Narconon to Open World's Largest Drug Rehabilitation Facility

Trained Scientologists to Staff Huge Oklahoma Facility

Narconon (meaning *drugs-free*), the only truly successful drug rehabilitation program on the planet, is readying a new 165-acre establishment for drug rehabilitation in the state of Oklahoma, U.S.A., due to open in the summer of 1989.

Narconon, part of ABLE (Association for Better Living and Education), which gets LRH technology applied broadly in the society, now leases the entire town of Chilocco, Oklahoma from an organization of local Indian tribes.

"Our association with the Oklahoma Indian tribes began in the Crystal Ballroom at the Flag Land Base in Florida," says Tom Armstrong, the Narconon Chilocco Project In-Charge. "The chief of the Ponca tribe sent a representative named Wayne Blueback to the Celebration of the Arts there last year. Wayne runs the drug rehab program in Ponca City, and when he found out that a technology really exists to solve the crushing burden of drug addiction - not just a change in the environment, but a real technology that works - he didn't lose any time getting the word out to tribal leaders."

Five tribes are involved in administering the site, formerly occupied by the Chilocco Indian School. It's a complete town of some 80 buildings, with its own fire department, wood and metal and machine workshops, golf course, swimming pool, sports fields and a 2000-seat auditorium.

Since the school closed its doors in 1979, at least 50 proposals for its use have been submitted to the Oklahoma Bureau of Indian Affairs. All have been turned down except Narconon. "We had to get past the Health Planning Commission," says Armstrong, "who investigate every application for its 'impact on existing health care.' They passed our applica-

LRH Public Relations technology, which makes full use of the Tone Scale in the handling of human emotion and reaction, just as Ron wrote it. Our lease agreement is set up so that everybody wins. Instead of a fixed payment, we are expected to return 10% of our gross income to the Indians and reinvest another 5% in improving the facilities. This was a major win.

During the negotiations, Narconon leaders distributed copies of the LRH Basic Books package, *The Way to Happiness* booklet, and basic LRH lecture tapes to the Indian leaders.

"One of them used an example from an LRH tape to illustrate a point he was making in conversation," Armstrong recalls.

Narconon Chilocco will be the largest drug rehabilitation establishment in the world, both in terms of the space it occupies and in its capacity to service individuals with drug problems. 800 people can be housed there at one time (in addition to staff), and can use L. Ron Hubbard's technology of drug rehabilitation to free themselves from this curse of modern society.

Narconon Chilocco will serve individuals from all over the United States and Canada. Their care will be covered by insurance or prepaid by the persons themselves. 25% of the

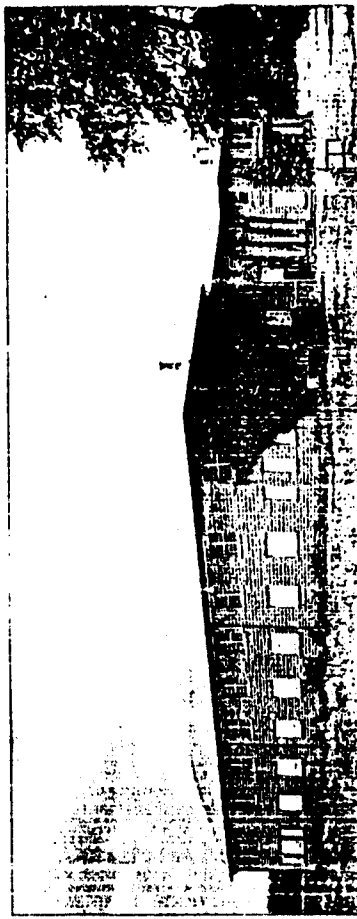
residents, with priority given to local Indians.

The dedication of the new Narconon Chilocco facility will feature a traditional Indian pow-wow (gathering) and dance competition.

The core staff will include Armstrong, his wife Cheri (an American Saint Hill Foundation student and a trained Course Supervisor), Jamie Culleeny (a Class V Auditor) and his wife Camille (a Course Supervisor and fully trained Hubbard Communications Office Area Secretary), and Edna Fulton (a hatted and experienced Purification Rundown Instructor). Tom plans to expand this staff to 15 quickly, prior to the grand opening.
